Greetings, brothers, from the beautiful Pacific Northwest. From the weather reports we receive here it appears many of you have not been enjoying a favorable winter in terms of the weather. In one real sense we have been lucky with temperatures being remarkably warm and with more sunshine than one would expect in this part of the world. The bad news is that with such little rainfall (we are down nearly 7 inches so far for the rain year starting October 1) coupled with the relative dearth of snowfall in our mountains, we are headed for a potentially drought filled summer. Brown lawns and droopy plants are but one problem. The real threat is the potential loss of much of our hydroelectric power. Then when our dams are opened to provide more flow to the turbines, the threat to our already endangered salmon populations will increase.

For those of you considering the purchase of a new or even first-time computer, right now is an excellent opportunity to obtain some very good pricing on excellent machines. And no, I am not a

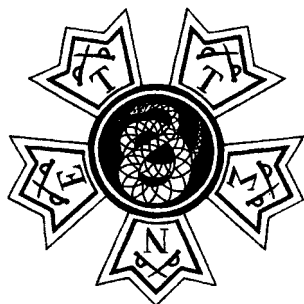

President's Message

In this "State of the Fraternity" message, I would like to report on our accomplishments to date, our on-going activities, and our future needs.

Accomplishments

In the past two years, we have taken care of a number of things in the legal and communication areas. We have new by-laws and articles of incorporation. We have held two elections by mail. The Corporation's reports have been filed with the Secretary of State of Iowa.

We are publishing a newsletter twice per year. A list server (e-mail repeater) provides for rapid communication among the 40 or so who are signed-up. Marshall Wilharm just completed a new and comprehensive web site.

In short, the SNHC is now able to act as an Alumni Association as well as a house owner, we are in good legal standing, and we are communicating with our members on a regular basis.

In Progress

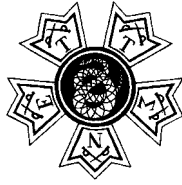
Work is in progress on paying our taxes, locating lost members, sorting our property, and establishing a fund-raising program.

The 1999 federal taxes have been paid, and work is underway on the 2000 federal tax return. Bob Thompson is working on the Iowa tax returns. Using information supplied by a number of members, we put together a more accurate picture of what went into the house, and this will significantly reduce the amount of capital-gains tax that we have to pay. Later this year we will prepare the revised 1998 federal return and pay our taxes on the sale.

After years of neglect, our address files were in a disastrous state with over 300 lost members. We have located over a quarter of the lost brothers and continue to make progress.

Our stored property has been sorted into three categories. Items of no value or historic significance were discarded. Useable items of no historic significance will be donated. Once this is done, we should be able to move all of our memorabilia and records into climate-controlled storage for about the same fee we are now paying.

**MINUTES OF THE THIRD MEETING OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS of the
SIGMA NU HOUSE COMPANY, INCORPORATED**
(Under the Amended and Restated By-laws)

A meeting of the Sigma Nu House Company, Incorporated was held by conference call on Saturday, February 10, 2001 at 11:00 P.M. EST. The meeting was called to order by Frederick H. Raab, President. Also in attendance were Dick Winchester, Steve Hill, and Dean Kruse.

The minutes of the second meeting (May 25, 2000) were approved.

REPORTS

Raab reported the results of the election: Thompson and Kruse were re-elected and the new Articles of Incorporation were adopted.

Treasurer Gammack reported in absentia savings and checking accounts at \$212,532.26 and \$5701.25, respectively. During 2000, there were \$915 of contributions from members, \$10,330.77 in interest earnings, and expenditures of \$3285.59.

Brother Hill reported on the status of our stored property. The furniture and other items that are to be donated remain in storage along with the memorabilia. The next smaller storage unit, 5 x 5 "closet" for \$25/month, is not large enough to hold the memorabilia. However, after the items to be donated are gone, it may be possible to place everything in climate-controlled storage for the same fee we are now paying. This would obviously be desirable for paper and photographs. Brother Hill will check with Brother Thompson and reports on plans for making the donations.

Brother Kruse reported that 48 members have contributed \$1100 in the voluntary dues program. The consensus was to continue including the forms in the newsletter, but also to include in the newsletter an article emphasizing the need for greater participation.

Currently, there are no working addresses for 238 members. Some of these may be deceased. We are trying to check the ISU data base. Dan Simpson has set-up a regional network to aid in locating lost brothers. Some of the addresses that have been found did not seem to make it into national's data base, so in the future all changes should be sent to national directly.

The consensus was to wait until more of the lost brothers were located before publishing an address book.

The possibility of holding an informal (low-key) reunion was discussed. The consensus was this spring was too early but fall might work. The survey showed that most would like to hold the reunion in conjunction with a sports event. The consensus was to talk to some of the volunteers from the Des Moines area to try to get someone local to head-up organizing the event.

Marshall Wilharm just completed a new, significantly expanded web site.

Brother Raab reported that he would be working on the revised 1998 tax return with the objective of paying our taxes on the sale as soon as possible. Brother Thompson is working on the 1999 Iowa tax return.

NEW BUSINESS

Brother Hill moved to re-elect all of the officers. Winchester seconded. Passed unanimously.

Brother Winchester moved to approve spring and fall newsletters for 2001. Hill seconded. Passed unanimously.

Future goals were discussed. The first priority for 2001 is to clear-up all remaining administrative and house-keeping matters. This includes federal taxes, state taxes, property disposition, and the address list. It is desirable eventually to synchronize the newsletter with Homecoming and Veishea so that it can be used to announce get-togethers. Clearing-up these matters will allow us to shift in 2002 to a primary focus on alumni activities.

The next board meeting is planned for early May.

It was suggested that board members prepare short biographical sketches for inclusion in the newsletter. The other members suggested that Brother Raab start.

Brother Kruse moved to adjourn. All concurred. The meeting was adjourned at 12:00 noon.

We established a voluntary-dues program with the objective of covering the annual operating expenses (about \$3k) so that interest earned on our savings could be retained for building a new house. In the first year, 50 members contributed an average of \$20 each.

Near Future

With the resolution of the various tax and property issues this year, we will be able to concentrate our efforts on building the Alumni Association. With a strong and fully functional Alumni Association ready to be in the driver's seat, we can then begin to think about recolonization and building a new house. For these things to happen, we will need greater participation of the membership. If you haven't already paid your voluntary dues for 2001, don't delay. Our accomplishments are the results of the efforts of many of our members. What talents do you have to share? Perhaps you could track-down a lost brother you knew or organize a local get-together.

Maybe you have some old photos and could put-together a piece of our history. There are many things to be done. We will be delighted to have your help.

My life began in Ft. Crook, Nebraska (now Offut AFB) in 1946. After the war ended, my family returned to Waterloo, Iowa, where I grew up. Frank Pechachek (ΓΣ 753) introduced me to fraternities during my senior year in high school by inviting me to spend the weekend at ΓΣ during Greek Week. I started at ISU in the fall of 1964 and pledged during rush week.



. . . then

The Sigma Nu house was home to me during all of my undergraduate years at ISU. Room #5 (on the second floor at the crossroads of the stairs, hall, dorm, and head) was mine for all but two quarters. I did my best to prevent illicit duplications of music tapes by "jamming" them with my ham radio. My brothers called me the "Squeeb" (translated roughly as "tightwad") and I was the owner of one large maroon 1950 Mercury they nicknamed "The Tank."

In addition to being the ΓΣ Recorder during my junior year, I was active in the student branch of the IEEE (Institution of Electrical and Electronics Engineers) and served as its president during my senior year. It was during that year that I tried to avoid one social obligation (a tea for a new housemother) by going to UNI for the weekend and stumbled into another better known as my wife Becky.

I became an ISU alumnus in May, 1968 and stayed on at ISU to earn my Ph.D. in 1972. Out of need for money, I took a job at Cincinnati Electronics. In 1975, we moved further east to Burlington, Vermont, again for reasons of employment. On July 3, 1980 (the Fourth was a Saturday), I declared my independence and started Green Mountain Radio Research Company.

GMRR is still my source of livelihood. It keeps me out of trouble – often six days a week – with consulting, design, and research on radio transmitters, now often called "wireless communications." My experience in jamming gained at ΓΣ allowed me to get some Army contracts, and some of my designs went into the TACJAM and PIRAHNA jammers that were used in the Gulf War. Thanks to ISU's requirement to pass an English test, I was able to coauthor a widely used EE text book *Solid State Radio Engineering*, and in 1995 I received ISU's Professional Achievement Citation in Engineering.
